

WHAT ARE THE STRING INSTRUMENTS OF THE ORCHESTRA?




FIRST VIOLIN

The smallest and highest-pitched instrument in the Strings family. Leader of the ensemble, often cuing the other musicians. Plays the main melody. Four strings tuned to G, D, A and E. The second violins play the support role. Often playing supporting harmonies and rhythms in the lower register.

VIOLA

Similar but different than the violin! The viola has a deeper sounding register, slightly larger, and has different tuning. The Viola plays the middle voice of the ensemble. Four strings tuned to C, G, D and A.

WHAT ARE THE STRING INSTRUMENTS OF THE ORCHESTRA? PART 2



CELLO

Bigger than a viola but smaller than a double bass! A low-pitched instrument that provides basslines and drives the rhythmic force. The cello also occasionally plays the melody! Four strings tuned to C, G, D and A.

DOUBLE BASS


The largest and lowest-pitched instrument in the Strings family. It emits low and muted tones, sometimes rhythmic, sometimes long, but almost always incredibly powerful. Four strings tuned to E, A, D and G.

THE KING, THE CAT, AND THE FIDDLE

The King had eight fiddlers, a wise cat called Joachim, and so many accountants that they could not be counted.

The King, the Cat, and the Fiddle is a magical story created by Christopher Hope and **Yehudi Menuhin**, one of history's greatest violinists!

This enchanting tale follows a music-loving king, a mischievous yet talented cat, and a magical violin as they embark on a whimsical adventure to bring joy to the kingdom through music.



Throughout this piece, you'll discover fascinating musical techniques like *pizzicato* (plucking the strings) and *legato* (smooth connected bowing), while also learning about legendary composers such as **Bach**, **Mozart**, and **Vivaldi**.

WHO IS YEHUDI MENUHIN? A WORLD-RENOWNED VIOLINIST, CONDUCTOR, AUTHOR, AND SO MUCH MORE!

Yehudi Menuhin is considered one of the greatest violinists in history! He co-wrote *The King, The Cat, and the Fiddle*, and was a violin prodigy who devoted his life to breaking down musical barriers.

He began playing the violin at just 4 years old! After mastering classical music, he expanded his repertoire to include rarely performed and new compositions.

Not only did Yehudi master the violin, but he also became a conductor, leading many of the world's major orchestras.



Fun Fact: he once conducted the Berlin Philharmonic with his feet! A devoted yoga student who did a headstand while on stage! See picture below:

Later in his career, Yehudi explored Jazz, recording music with the legendary jazz violinist *Stephane Grappelli*.

A one-of-a-kind musician, Yehudi Menuhin was always looking to expand his craft and push the boundaries of music!



THE NIGHTINGALE

Hans Christian Andersen's *The Nightingale* is a timeless fairy tale that tells the story of an Emperor and a nightingale while exploring the themes of beauty, nature, and the transformative power of music.

The Story:

Long ago in China, an Emperor hears of a little nightingale whose song is said to be the most beautiful in the world.

When he finally listens to the bird sing, he is deeply moved. However, he is given a bejeweled mechanical nightingale, and he forgets about the real bird. Over time, the artificial bird breaks, and when the Emperor falls gravely ill, the real nightingale returns. Its pure and heartfelt song revives his spirit, teaching him the irreplaceable value of authenticity and true beauty.

The Music:


Bruce Adolphe composed a musical adaption of *The Nightingale*, which you'll hear today! **If you listen closely, you can hear the difference between the real and mechanical nightingale.**

- <u>The real nightingale's song</u> is characterized by flowing *legato* lines, often using *trills* and fast fluttering notes to mimic the sound of a real bird. its melody is expressive, with great *dynamic* contrast!
- <u>The mechanical bird's song</u> is rigid and repetitive, featuring **staccato** notes and precise, clockwork-like rhythms. its melody remains steady with unchanging dynamics, reflecting the artificial nature of its song.





FARMONY

Bruce Adolphe's *Farmony* is a charming and imaginative composition that brings the sounds of a farm to life through music! Adolphe masterfully blends humor, storytelling, and intricate musical textures to create a piece that is both entertaining and thought-provoking.

The Music:

Farmony features a variety of compositional techniques that enhance its storytelling and musical imagery:

- Instrument Imitation: The 1st violin performs short *staccato* notes to resemble a clucking chicken, while the cello's deep, rounded tones mimic the sound of a mooing cow. The viola's bright, nasal *timbre* imitates the bleating of a sheep, and the 2nd violin's rapid, fluttering notes mimic the chirping of birds.
- Rhythmic Playfulness: Syncopated rhythms and unexpected accents create a sense of movement and spontaneity, much like the unpredictable behaviors of farm animals. Plucked pizzicato notes in the lower strings may evoke the trotting of a horse or the scampering of small animals.

Composer Spotlight: BRUCE ADOLPHE

Bruce Adolphe (1955-present) is an American composer and pianist.

He was born exactly at midnight, making it unclear whether his birthday falls on May 31st or June 1st!


As a child, Bruce's parents bought him a toy piano, but their family parakeet pecked it apart!

✤ He began composing music at age 10.

At a young age, he studied piano, clarinet, guitar, bass and even bassoon!

He established a family concert series known as Meet the Music! where he writes both the scripts and music.

Bruce is currently the Director of Family Concerts of the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center in New York.

Oscar Bustillo



Oscar Bustillo is a composer, performing artist and teacher. In collaboration with Belinda Niling Stohner, Oscar & HoBuCo have presented stories with live music at PAMM, Miami History Museum, Orchestra Miami at the Banyan Bowl, and was also featured on

WLRN radio to showcase Rumpelstiltskin. His original music has been played in symphony halls, art galleries, on television, and in movies. His score for Jenny Lee's Indie short, Claire (2008), won him First Prize for Film Score 2009,

from the Music Teachers Association of California. Oscar has composed original concert music, and he has been commissioned for commercial TV music, short films and documentary scores. Oscar's Cuban song 'Oyeme!' was selected for Kenny Richie's film, The Strongest Man, which debuted at the Sundancep Film Festival and Miami Film Festival in 2015. Oscar's other artistic projects include collaborations with international and Miami-based artists, including Misael Soto, Shana Lutker, Alan Gutierrez, Patricia Margarita Hernandez, Elite Kedan, David Briske, Liz Ferrer, DWTNARTS, Leonardo Valencia, The International Sound Arts Festival, and many others.


